The naturalization self-test is a study tool to help you test your knowledge of U.S. history and government. The actual civics test is NOT a multiple choice test. The civics test is an oral test. During your naturalization interview, you will be asked up to 10 questions from the list of 100 questions. You must answer 6 out of 10 questions correctly to pass the civics portion of the naturalization test.

2. The link below is the one you should go through. Divide up the test into 10 parts - questions 1-10, 11-20, 21-30, etc. Answer at least 30 questions. How many did you get right out of each set of ten that you did? Remember, you must answer at least 6 out of 10 to pass this part of the test.
3. What kind of effect does technology have on our culture?
4. Are these test questions the questions that we should be asking? If not, what kind of questions should be asked?
5. How does the policy that says you must take this test to become a naturalized U.S. citizen serve to protect our culture?
